**THE JUNIOR LEAGUE OF MORRISTOWN
HONORS VOLUNTEERISM THROUGH SCHOLARSHIPS**

(June 15, 2009 – Morristown, NJ) - The Junior League of Morristown has announced its annual scholarship recipients for 2009.

Part of the mission of the Junior League is to promote voluntarism in the community. Five students from Morris County were selected based on their exceptional performance and outstanding volunteerism demonstrated through various charities. Four of the students will be attending college in the fall; the fifth award is called the Women Moving Forward Scholarship and is given to a woman over 35 years old who is continuing her education while remaining committed to volunteering.

- Justine Magnusson (Rockaway), a Morris Knolls High School student, was presented this award after her extraordinary volunteer work with senior citizens, special needs children and children in hospitals.
- Imani Ladson (Morristown), another Morristown High School student, has been presented with this award for her exceptional work with Delta Sigma Theta sorority's "Growing and Empowering Myself Successfully" program. She plans to attend Spelman College in the fall.
- West Morris Mendham High School student Brian Stellingwerf (Chester) received this award for his dedication to community volunteerism. Stellingwerf began volunteering at the early age of eleven by helping less fortunate families in his community.
- Mathew Certner (Morristown) of Morristown High school created the Morristown Sports Clinic for Children with Special Needs. Certner received this scholarship award for his determination to empower special needs children while enriching the lives of their parents, siblings, and mentors. He plans to study humanitarian efforts at Duke University in the fall.
- Lisa Kielblock (Morristown) has received this year's Women Moving Forward Scholarship Award for her continuing education at the College of St. Elizabeth and the pursuit of becoming a nurse manager or professor. Despite her continued education, 26-year marriage and five children (including caring for one daughter with mild cerebral palsy and a son with profound ADD), she has remained committed to a spirit of volunteerism that continues despite her busy schedule.
